Curling is one game in which playing as a team is an absolute must, and why suggest that one player is letting his team down by not curling up to par? There are so many facets of the game that depend upon team work; weight and delivery are, of course, up to the individual. but the sweeping and how it is controlled by the nonsweepers has to be an absolute factor in the outcome of the games which are played under the terrific amount of pressure which builds up in games of this calibre.
