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Thursday evening John Habicht and I took the particulars of some 70 kids who came to join and Saturday morning I got help from John's wife and his son Pierre. This time we ran the count to some 123 kids overall and there were one or two who took forms and said they would turn them in at John's home.

On our Saturday morning session we had a visit from a Clyde Moore who signed up his kids and told us he was living in Trail at the present time but would be moving to Rossland in June. He and his wife both have had considerable experience in the soccer field up at Fort Mc-Murray and other places in B.C.

Up there, from what Clyde told us, they have initiated a six-man system for the Mosquitos which allows the wee ones to get in more field time. From what he explained to us, this is one category in which the rules regarding coaching are fairly flexible as the coach is allowed on the field to act in any capacity he sees it, coach, trainer, fatherconfessor, referee or general morale-booster.

The kids play on a restricted field, Clyde tells us, so two games can proceed at once on a regulation soccer field, one in each half, playing crossways.

From what we gathered on Saturday, the Moores will be a welcome addition to Rossland's soccer family. It's not too often that we get an offer of this kind of specialized help with experience built in.

Most of us might have had soccer experience but we had to learn the niceties of the technical aspects of running a program. Welcome, Moores, to Rossland. We don't have a large executive but if we get the help we need, it will be adequate and not unwieldy.

Schedules and playing times should soon be forthcoming from the various leagues we well be participating in, so watch for them in your schools or on the various billboards around town. We'll get the message to you one way or another.

John Habicht is also very active in the fun softball movement, a member of the executive of Rossland's super-active Fun league.
