The findings of the meeting reversed a decision made at the Legion convention in Kaslo earlier this fall to hold branch playdowns, with winners in the two categories, senior and junior, to advance to a playoff in Rossland to determine who would advance to the provincial playoffs.

This format was roundly criticized by quite a number of knowledgeable curlers around the district, mainly because the cost factor of subsidizing rinks to go on to the provincial and national playdowns is growing by leaps and bounds every year and it was thought the idea of the comradeship of Legion

curling was being lost to the increasing commercialism.

The meeting passed a motion to hold a West Kootenay bonspiel for anyone interested, from any branch in the zone, in Rossland early in the New Year with rinks to make arrangements, if they so desire, to go on in competition at their own expense, in order to do this they would have to notify the provincial command they would be the West Kootenay representative, before the end of 1981.

To make the annual 'spiel attractive to Legion curlers it is hoped to arrange for some good prizes and keep the cost of entries to a reasonable level.
