In a telephone conversation with Jack a couple of days back he filled me in on some aspects of the project which may make interesting reading. He tells me that a gent by the name of Bert Robertson of Vancouver, heads up a 13-member committee in charge of the conduct of the project and from what he says these people have done their homework pretty well.

The riders will be equipped with new 15-speed bikes and will move out from Mile "0" at Esquimalt on May 23. They must be over 60 and carry a medical report as to their fitness to take on something like the task ahead of them. They are required to be in possession of sufficient money for food and expenses to take care of the necessities of the proposed four-month trip. They will travel back by bus.

Money to finance the groundwork of this venture has been made available from the New Horizons project, which does a lot of good work helping senior citizens help themselves, and from the B.C. Lotteries. Jack mentioned that Williams Moving and Storage will supply transport for the gear to be taken along by the participants other than their back packs. Taymor Industries will look after the cooking supplies

and the preparation will be undertaken by 50 volunteers divided into five groups.

There have been three workshops conducted at the coast to show the participants how to take care of their gear and Gino has attended them. The ride has been dubbed, the Spinning Wheel. Professional photographers will accompany the trek and seniors clubs all across the country will be contacted with an eye to the publicity for the project. It is hoped to make this an annual worldwide project. Jack has been told that a possible ride around China is proposed and could take place as early as next year.

So, as these intrepid oldsters climb on their bikes on May 23 we will just sit back and hope to watch the coverage it will get on TV and wish them all the luck in the world.
