

The Grand Forks Border Bruins were really sent reeling on Tuesday evening at the Rossland Arena. The last time they visited they used the goaltending skills of young Mike McNeely to fashion a pretty convincing win over a listless Rossland team. However, in their last visit to Rossland this season the Bruins were no match for the high-flying Warriors.

Brian Zollen, recently returned to the club from Prince George, started things off with his first of six goals on the night and the Warriors never let up. The two Ferguson boys, Dan and Terry, had one and three goals respectively and Gary Cahoon also had a hat-trick. Single goals went to Rod Deibert, Tony Bobbitt, Rob Porcellato, Gord Stanton, Patrick Corrado and John Howes.

Garnet Compton had to be helped off the ice early in the first period when he crashed heavily into the boards, knocking himself out. We sure hope he didn't sustain too bad an injury as the Warriors need his knack of goal-scoring as they battle for a spot in the playoffs. I understand his Beaver Valley buddy, Russ Fuhr, has been lost to the club for the time being with a shoulder injury. These two boys have really helped the Warriors this season and we can ill afford to lose them now.

For the Bruins, who were

really never in it, Kurtis Esau, David Soukeroff and Martin Jensen managed to get the puck past a very steady Steve McIntyre. For the Bruins it has been a long season, with only three wins to show for their labors.

Trail Curling Glub and see how the boys make out on the final day of the spiel. Rinks besides Jake's are skipped by Angus Popplewell, Russ Broughton and Dan Burnett.

Another will start immediately and be finished by Feb. 12 and we can start our final one on Valentine's Day and lead up to a final mini bonspiel around the end of March.
